












FINANCIAL REPORT

From July 1, 2022 to
June 30, 2023, the
finance department
processed disbursements
and receipts totaling \$8.3
million and \$9.3 million,
respectively, for the ASB
and its related foundations.
In addition, the department
monitors all invested funds.

Other duties of this department include providing reporting to meet tax and other financial reporting deadlines required by state and federal guidelines; handling all travel preapprovals and reimbursements for the agency; formulating and submitting the annual state budget appropriation as approved by the board of bar commissioners; and compiling all required documents for examinations/audits performed by the Examiner of Public Accounts and external auditors.

#### **ADMISSIONS CEREMONY**

On Oct. 20, we celebrated more than 250 new admittees at the annual Bar Admission Ceremony in Montgomery.



#### **MID-YEAR MEETING**

The Alabama State Bar hosted a Mid-Year Meeting in Mobile, on Jan. 18-20. More than 180 lawyers attended and 23 CLEs were presented.

Attorneys who attended our Noontime Knowledge Luncheon on Thursday were inspired by retired NFL quarterback Ryan Leaf, who shared his story of addiction and the journey through his recovery.





#### HALL OF FAME

The Alabama State Bar inducted five new attorneys into the Alabama Lawyers Hall of Fame on May 5. The inductees of the 2022 class were Harold Vaughan Hughston, James Taylor Jones, Arthur Alexander Madison, Clarence Frost Rhea, and Janie Ledlow Shores.



# FRED GRAY, SR. COURTYARD GROUNDBREAKING



On Apr. 19, Fred Gray, Sr. and his family joined leaders of the Alabama State Bar to officially break ground on the Fred Gray, Sr. Courtyard adjacent to the bar's offices in Montgomery. The new installations that will be constructed inside the courtyard will honor Mr.



Gray and his life's work of advocating for civil rights and underserved communities.

#### **LEGAL FOOD FRENZY**

The 8th Annual Alabama Legal Food Frenzy raised \$71,679.29 to fight hunger, which equates to more than 350,000 meals for foodinsecure Alabamians. In all, 44 law firms and legal organizations participated in the 2023 competition, and this year brought the largest outcome in the fundraiser's history.



Congratulations to Martin & Helms P.C. in Huntsville for winning the Attorney General's Cup, marking the fourth year in a row this law firm has won top honors.



#### LAW DAY: MAY 1

Gov. Kay Ivey presented the Alabama State Bar with a proclamation which highlights this year's theme, Cornerstones of Democracy: Civics, Civility, and Collaboration.

To commemorate this year's theme, Alabama attorneys visited classrooms throughout the state, either virtually or in person, to talk to students about the profession of law, discuss the benefits of remaining civil in a disagreement, and understand the importance of civil discourse in society.









#### LEGISLATIVE BREAKFAST

The Alabama State Bar hosted a breakfast on May 18 for new legislators along with Judiciary Committee Chairs Senator Will Barfoot and Representative Jim Hill. This was a great event that gave us the opportunity to inform newly elected members of the legislature about the Alabama State Bar and how we serve the public and the profession.

Each year, thousands of Alabama lawyers donate their professional skills, time, and expertise to assist low-income families and individuals who cannot afford to hire a lawyer and would otherwise be unable to receive access to civil legal assistance. This pro bono work is critical for families living in poverty and highly fulfilling for the attorneys who provide the service.

There are thousands of Alabamians of moderate means who have no idea how to find a lawyer and appear to underutilize attorneys. The Alabama State Bar Lawyer Referral Service is an ideal way to assist paying clients to locate a competent attorney who charges a reasonable fee to complete a legal task efficiently and in a timely manner.

The fee for membership is \$100 per year and includes up to 10 practice areas. Additional practice areas are available for \$5 each per year. Individuals joining the service on April 1 or later will be charged \$50 for the remainder of the fiscal year and will need to renew in September to remain in the service after September 30th. Charges will not be further prorated for those who join at other times of the year.
