The following benchmarks and accomplishments represent the **Seeds of Hope** planted during the past year through the **Harvesting Hope** initiative.



NOW ROOTED AS A 501(C)(3)

Harvesting Hope is officially a nonprofit, opening doors to growth, support, and sustainability for years to come.

MENTOR PROGRAM IN FULL BLOOM

Nearly 50 lawyers statewide have volunteered to be part of the mentorship program to help new lawyers plant confident roots.

YOUNG SHOOTS TAKING ROOT

Four new lawyers have taken root in rural communities with fewer than one attorney per 1,000 residents.

FERTILE GROUND FOR GROWTH

Expense models and possible income streams have been developed to show a sustainable path for lawyers to grow practices in small towns and underserved areas.

CROSS-POLLINATION IN ACTION

Other states have taken notice, not just of our model, but of the mindset. The term "legal opportunity zone" has reframed rural need as rural potential, inspiring bar leaders beyond Alabama.

SUPPORT FROM THE GROUND UP

With programs already in place within the Alabama State Bar's Law Practice Management program, new lawyers are equipped to thrive.

SEEDS THAT TRAVEL

The Harvesting Hope message has been shared at more than 60 events across Alabama, spanning more than 15,000 miles driven by Harvesting Hope Task Force Chair Tom Heflin alone. Every stop: another seed planted.

CULTIVATING SUPPORT FROM LEADERS

The initiative has taken root in conversations with top state decision-makers, helping equip the soil for future growth of the initiative.

Rural Counties


49 counties in Alabama are classified as legal deserts, with less than one lawyer per 1,000 residents.

BOARD ACTION ITEMS*

BBC MEETING | JUNE 26 & JUNE 29, 2024

- Approved bar licensure fees at the continued reduced rate of \$300 regular membership and \$150 special membership
- Approved Young Lawyers Section Bylaws Amendments
- Approved amendment to Alabama Rules Governing Admission Rule II to authorize electronically submitted, digitally certified paper item packets for the admissions process (subject to Supreme Court approval)
- Approved amendment to ARGA Rule VI(B) to extend the maximum bar exam score ages from 25 months to 36 months (subject to Supreme Court approval)

BBC MEETING | SEPT. 13, 2024

- Approved Staff Compensation for FY 2024–2025 at a total of \$3,561,062 to include a 2% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) and a 1% merit increase
- ASBF Board of Trustees approved the FY 2025 Alabama State Bar Foundation Budget at \$1,543,200 to include the purchase of a new HVAC system

BBC MEETING | NOV. 1, 2024

 FY 2026 budget approved at \$7,066,645.00, a slight decrease over FY 2025

BBC MEETING | JAN. 24, 2025

- Approved a reduction in *The Alabama Lawyer* publication schedule to four quarterly editions per year
- Approved dissolution of the Communication Law Section and disbursement of \$15 in account to the Section Administrative Fund

BBC MEETING | MARCH 21, 2025

- Approved revisions to the Code of Professional Courtesy
- Approved amendment to Rule 1, Alabama Rules of Disciplinary Procedure
- Approved amendment to Rule 8.5, Alabama Rules of Professional Conduct

BBC MEETING | MAY 2, 2025

- Approved a one-year waiver of \$25 Client Security Fund assessment
- Adopted the standard State of Alabama Holiday schedule for employees of the Alabama State Bar
- Approved the payment of board member lodging at the 2025 Annual Meeting







FINANCIAL REPORT

The ASB finance director and financial assistant collaborate with officers and staff routinely to manage the various funding resources and fund accounts of the Alabama State Bar in an effective manner. Among the key roles of the finance department are to formulate and manage the annual state budget appropriation, provide fundamental reporting to keep stakeholders up-to-date on financial performance and make informed financial decisions, manage vendor payment activity and travel requirements, oversee cash receipts and cash flow management functions, forecast and analyze financial data and trends, state and federal tax reporting requirements, and compile all required documents for examinations/audits performed by the Examiner of Public Accounts and external auditors.

In FY 2024, the finance department processed approximately \$9.2 million and \$9.25 million in cash receipts and disbursements transactions, respectively, for the ASB and its closely related foundation entities in addition to administering \$20.6 million of invested funds under the supervision of Regions Wealth Management.

- Coordinated effective budget management practices that have supported reduced membership dues for more than five years.
- Maintained an unmodified audit opinion issued by external auditors on the ASB financial statement audits.
- Served as designee to implement the new budgeting and payroll systems released by the State of Alabama last year.

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















CHANGES TOTHE ALABAMA LAWYER

ALABAMA CODE OF PROFESSIONAL COURTESY

- A lawyer should never attempt to deceive a client, another lawyer, or a tribunal.
- 2. A lawyer must honor promises and commitments made to another lawyer.
- 3. A lawyer should make all reasonable efforts to schedule matters with opposing counsel by agreement.
- 4. A lawyer should strive to maintain a cordial and respectful relationship with opposing counsel.
- A lawyer should seek sanctions against opposing counsel only where required for the protection of the client and not merely for tactical advantage.
- A lawyer should not make unfounded accusations of unethical conduct about opposing counsel.
- A lawyer should never intentionally embarrass another lawyer and should avoid personal criticism of another lawyer.
- 8. A lawyer should always be punctual.
- 9. A lawyer should always seek informal agreement on procedural and preliminary matters before involving the court.
- 10. When each adversary proceeding ends, a lawyer should shake hands with the fellow lawyer who is the adversary, and the losing lawyer should refrain from engaging in any conduct which engenders disrespect for the court, the adversary or the parties.

- 11. A lawyer should communicate with opposing counsel to avoid litigation if possible and identify areas of potential agreement where they exist, remembering the obligation to be courteous to other lawyers.
- 12. A lawyer should recognize that advocacy does not include harassment or needless delay.
- 13. In all methods of communication with opposing counsel, a lawyer should communicate with civility and professionalism.
- 14. A lawyer should be ever mindful that any motion, trial, court appearance, deposition, pleading, or legal technicality costs someone time and money, and as such, should not take actions deliberately designed to increase said time and money for opposing parties.
- 15. A lawyer should stand to address the court, be courteous, and not engage in recrimination with the court.
- 16. During any court proceeding, whether in the courtroom, in chambers, or by video conference, a lawyer should dress in proper attire to show proper respect for the court and the law.
- 17. A lawyer should not become too closely associated with a client's activities or emotionally involved with a client.
- 18. A lawyer should always act with integrity and should remember that the practice of law is neither an opportunity to make outrageous demands upon vulnerable opponents nor blind resistance to a just claim; being stubbornly litigious for a plaintiff or a defendant is not professional.

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
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
